ARE OUR MISTAKES FOREVER?

Parkland High School student Kyle Kashuv recently graduated second in his class and was one of two students admitted to Harvard, as a freshman, this fall. Kyle, the son of Israeli parents survived the school shooting a year ago, and has since gained national attention for his recommendation to institute school training programs and reporting systems. Regrettably two years prior to the shootings, young Kyle wrote a series of racist and anti-Semitic posts on social media, reflecting his immaturity, using hateful speech. He has since apologized, retracted and denounced his own words. He admitted his comments were ignorant and hurtful. Harvard University rescinded his acceptance when they became aware of Kyle's social media posting which had happened two years prior.

Moreover, Harvard refused to reconsider their acceptance reversal with no possible appeal.

Kyle has grown up, but Harvard refuses to accept that. Throughout Harvard's history, their own faculty have included segregationists, anti-Semites and professors who promote

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death to Israel in public forums. But for Kyle, Harvard is suggesting that growth isn't possible, which defies Jewish tradition. Our teachings tell us it isn't what we have done in the past that defines us, but rather what we believe, and are doing NOW. Everyone is capable of mistakes, but it is the capacity to repair those mistakes if possible, and not repeat them going forward, that is important.

Kyle's situation is very different than raging public anti-Semites who have never denounced their own remarks, nor apologized. Kyle has grown up since the Parkland shootings and should not be punished, for the rest of his life, for a teenage indiscretion two years prior to a life **Dr. Jack L. Sparks, Rabbi**

changing event. He and his classmates have already paid the price.

Our tradition judges us on what we are thinking now, not where our minds have been as teens, or in the past. All of us make mistakes, all of us make vows to self-correct and none of us are punished in perpetuity; for that is G-d's law. I am grateful I am not judged on what I said or wrote as a 16 year old.

May this New Year allow us to repent for the past and let us vow to move forward with proper thoughts, words and deeds.

This is the last bulletin before we begin the Hebrew year 5780. We are now spending our Torah readings with the Israelites stuck in the desert, awaiting their entry to the Promised Land. Alas, the closer they get to the land, the worse their journey becomes: They are encountering now people who fight them, curse them and seduce them- all to prevent them from fulfilling the promise of one nation, under one God, in the Promised Land (Canaan). They have been losing their parents, and suffered from lack of faith in their God and their leaders.

The desert is a harsh environment. Each of us may find ourselves often in that space. A time when we worry, we are afraid, we are mourning, looking forward with hesitation and insecurity to a new phase in our life. Summer in Florida is full of this worry- mainly because of the Hurricane season above us. Also because we may be traveling and depend on others for our protection. Now is the time to find a system that will help us through the desert and the difficulties.

Some say faith is the best solace and comfort. Have faith that all will turn out for the best- because God loves you, or you are loved, or because thinking positively is healthy and helpful.
